It is essential to follow post-operative instructions to minimise these risks.

### 4. What happens after?

After umbilical hernia repair, patients should maintain an active but cautious lifestyle, starting with walking and avoiding heavy lifting for four to six weeks. Most can return to work within one to two weeks, with possible modifications for physically demanding jobs, and driving is typically allowed after one to two weeks, based on the surgeon's guidance. Adhering to post-operative care instructions is crucial, and immediate medical attention is essential for any severe or unusual symptoms.
